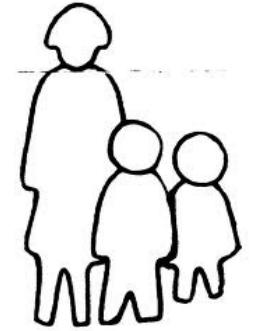

- 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1 The apostle Paul reminds the Corinthians that although their present situation doesn't look good, they have a bright future with Jesus Christ.

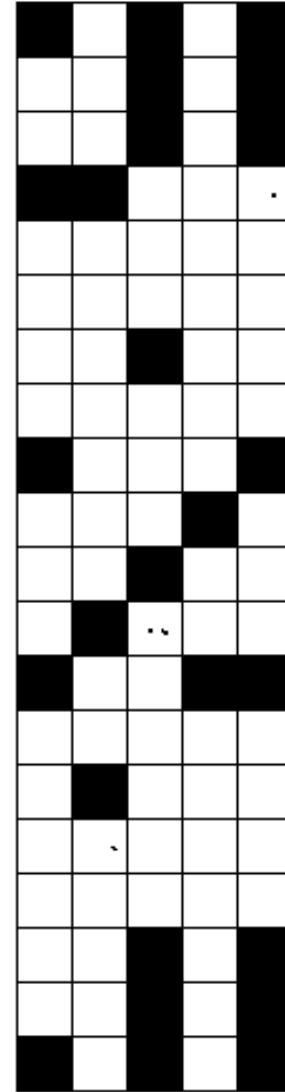
